


# MAJULI COLLEGE: A PEDAGOGIC PARADISE

Established on September 17, 1962 at Kamalabari, with a sacred mission of illuminating the river-island with the beacon of education, Majuli College is the premier institution of higher education, the oldest of its kind in Majuli, the only island district of Assam. What necessitated the college to be founded was the geographical isolation and educational backwardness of the most populous river-island of the world. Connecting it with the mainstream of the country was a challenge in the early sixties. A host of conscious educationists and public activists realized that it could be done only through the pursuit of higher learning. A public meeting was held at Majuli Milan Sangha, Kamalabari in the month of March, 1962 with the sole objective of having a discussion on founding a college to impart higher education to the Majulians. The meeting constituted a steering committee consisting of members from all communities to go ahead with the task. Late Keshabram Borah was made President and Late Krishna Kanta Goswami Secretary of the steering committee. It was a time when devastating floods were posing tremendous threat to their historic endeavour, but, these two illustrious sons of Majuli along with a few devoted persons toured every nook and corner on foot and mobilized public opinion, collected donations for the proposed college. Thus, the dream of opening a college was fulfilled. It is worth remembering that another ideal son of Majuli Atul Chandra Goswami, who was serving as a lecturer in History at North Lakhimpur College then, was kind enough to agree to serve the newly established college as its honorary Principal. He continued his service in this capacity till 1995. In the long span the college has left no stone unturned to emulate a high standard of pedagogic excellence by being sensitive to the ever expanding parameters of quality education. The stupendous success of our Silver Jubilee Celebrations in 1988 and Golden Jubilee Celebrations in 2013 speaks of the glorious tradition of this institution. Products of Majuli College are serving in government offices, schools, colleges and universities and different private establishments with dedication, sincerity and innovative thinking inherited from this institution.

Affiliated to Dibrugarh University, Majuli College has been imparting education at the Under Graduate level in both Arts and Science streams. While the Arts stream has been functioning since inception, the Science stream was started in the year 1978 and it came under Deficit Grants in Aid system in 1986. Presently, the college has 10 (ten) departments in Arts stream and 5 (five) departments in Science stream. Offering both Higher Secondary and Degree courses to about 1000 students per year, Majuli College is the only college in the island which has both Arts and Science streams. The college offers P.G. courses in Distance Learning Mode under Dibrugrah University and U.G. and P.G. courses in various subjects under Krishna Kanta Handiqui State Open University. Other than these, the college offers vocational courses for the benefit of the students in Tourism, Journalism, Computer Applications, Mask Making, and Sattriya Dance and Music at its own discretion. With support and co-operation of a host of dynamic and forward-looking professionals the college vows to leave its indelible imprints on the sands of time.

### **Location of the College:**

Majuli College is located at Kamalabari, the cultural and business hub of Majuli, the newly declared district in the upper part of the Brahmaputra Valley of Assam. The College is surrounded by three historic *sattras* (Vaishnavite monasteries) -- Uttar Kamalabari, Natun Kamalabari and Bengenaati and also by a vast paddy field at its back and a beautiful stream to its east. Such uncanny surroundings lend a spiritual and serene ambience to the college.

#### (II) HIGHER SECONDARY (SCIENCE)

- (a) Compulsory Subjects:
  - (i) English
  - (ii) MIL: Assamese
- **(b) Optional Subjects:** A student has to select any one of the following combination of subjects:
  - (i) Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics
  - (ii) Physics, Chemistry and Biology.

Students opting for (i) above may also offer Biology while those opting for (ii) may offer Mathematics as an additional subject.

#### (III) DEGREE COURSE UNDER CBCS (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM)

- a) **Bachelor of Arts (BA):** A student passed the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council, or an equivalent examination (10+2) recognized as such by the University.
- b) **Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.)**: A student passed the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) in Science stream of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council, or an equivalent examination (10+2) recognized as such by the University. For admission into the B.Sc. in Chemistry, Physics and Geology Honours, a candidate must pass the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) in Science stream of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council or an equivalent examination with passing Mathematics as a subject.
- c) **Bachelor of Vocational (I.T) (B.Voc.-IT):** A student passed the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council, or an equivalent examination (10+2) recognized as such by the University.

Computation of SGPA and CGPA: The procedure to compute the SGPA and CGPA are given below

(i) The SGPA is the ratio of the sum of the products of the number of credits with the grade points scored by a student in all the courses taken by a student and the sum of the number of credits off all the courses undergone by a student.

Where Ci is the number of credit of the ith course and Gi is the grade point scored by the student in the ith course.

The SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to two decimal points and reported in the transcripts.

- (iii) Conversion of CGPA in to percentage (%): CGPA will be multiplied by 10.
  Percentage of marks = (CGPA X 10)
- (iv) The Letter grade 'B' and above shall be considered as First Class and Letter grade 'B' shall be considered as Second Class.
- (v) A student is considered to have completed a course successfully and earned the prescribed credits if he/she secures a letter grade other than F (Failed) or 'Abs' (Absent/Incomplete).
- (vi) If a candidate secures 'F' grade in a Course, he/she shall have to reappear in the Course in the next legitimate chance.
- (vii) If a student secures 'F' grade in Project Work/ Dissertation/ assignment etc., he/she shall have to re-submit it after necessary revisions. The Result shall be declared with next regular batch.
- (viii) 'Abs' grade shall be awarded to a candidate if he/she has not fulfilled the following requirements:
- (a) If a candidate fails to appear in any Course(s) in an end semester examination.
- (b) If a candidate fails to submit the project work/dissertation / assignment of an end semester examination.
- (c) If a candidate is certified as not eligible to appear in any course(s) in an end semester examination by the Course Teacher(s) due to insufficient attendance in lectures, tutorials practical or fieldworks.
- (ix) The candidates not appearing in a Semester Examination shall be considered as an 'Abs' candidate and that will be reflected in the Grade Sheet of the candidate. These candidates shall have to convert the 'Abs' grade by appearing in the next examination on the Course (provided he/ she has legitimate chance to appear the Course) concerned or by submitting project work/dissertation/ assignment etc.

**Academic Schedule:** The Academic Schedule of the UG Certificate, UG Diploma, Three Year UG Degree, Four Year UG Degree (Honours) and Four Year UG Degree (Honours with Research) Programmes shall be administered as per the Academic Calendar of the University published for every academic session.

#### **Admission Notice and Criteria:**

Newspaper Notice/Notification through University/College/Institutes websites inviting applications for admission into the different programmes shall be issued by the Registrar of the University/Principals of the colleges/institutes as per the Academic Calendar of the University. The minimum eligibility for admission into the UG programmes shall be as below:

Minimum eligibility criteria for admission in Four Year Undergraduate programmes: Senior Secondary School Leaving Certificate or Higher Secondary (Class 12) Certificate obtained after successful completion of Grade 12 or equivalent stage of education and/or Admission test conducted by College/University/National Level Testing Agency/State Level Testing Agency.

#### Minimum eligibility criteria for multiple entry points of the UG programmes

**1st Year:** Senior Secondary School Leaving Certificate or Higher Secondary (Class 12) Certificate obtained after successful completion of Grade 12 or equivalent stage of education and/or Admission test conducted by College/University/National Level Testing Agency/State Level Testing Agency.

**2nd Year:** A certificate obtained after successful completion of 1 year (2 semesters) of the undergraduate programme. These students are to take admission in the 2<sup>nd</sup> year within a period of three years from

obtaining the UG certificate from Dibrugarh University or any other University/institution recognized by Dibrugarh University.

**3rd Year:** A diploma obtained after successful completion of 2 years (4 semesters) of the undergraduate programme. These students are to take admission in the 3<sup>rd</sup> year UG programme within a period of three years from obtaining the UG diploma from Dibrugarh University or any other University/institution recognized by Dibrugarh University.

**4th Year (Honours):** A Bachelor's degree after successful completion of three years (6 semesters) of the Undergraduate programme obtained from Dibrugarh University or any other University/institution recognized by Dibrugarh University. These students are to complete the degree within the stipulated maximum period of seven years.

**4th Year (Honours with Research):** A three year Bachelor Degree with a minimum of 7.5 CGPA. The minimum entry requirement for 4<sup>th</sup> year (Honours/Research) UG programme within a period of three years from obtaining 3 year Bachelor Degree from Dibrugarh University or any other University/institution recognized by Dibrugarh University. These students are to complete the degree within the stipulated maximum period of seven years.

The admission or eligibility criteria shall be fixed by the Academic Council from time to time whenever necessary. The University/ colleges/ institutes may also adopt own policy for admission or selection of eligible candidates for admission complying with the eligibility criteria as prescribed. Statutory reservation policy of the government shall be followed in case of selection of eligible candidates for admission.

A Course may also take the form of a Dissertation/ Project work/ Practical training/ Fieldwork/Internship, etc. A student shall have to study the academic programme as per the scheme of the Programme. Even if a candidate earns the required number of credits before completion of the full duration of the programme, he/she shall not be entitled for the degree.

#### **Course Enrolment**

The minimum and maximum credits to be opted by a student for qualifying of a Undergraduate programme shall be as per the Course Structure given as **Annexure I.** 

**Change in Major:** Students shall be allowed to change major within the broad discipline at the end of the second semester by giving him/her sufficient time to explore interdisciplinary courses during the first year. The HEIs may create 10% additional seats over and above the sanctioned strength to accommodate the request for a change of major.

**Change in Minor:** Students shall be allowed to change Minor courses of his/her areas of interest within the broad discipline at the end of the third semester. If a student pursuing a major obtains a minimum of 12 credits from another branch then the student will be awarded Bachelor degree in previous with a minor in later.

#### **Attendance**

The Course Teacher shall be responsible for maintaining a record of attendance of students who have enrolled for the course. All Course Teachers of college/institutions shall intimate the Principal/ Director of a college/ Institute through the Head of the Department concerned at least thirty calendar days before the last instruction day in the semester, the particulars of all students who have less than 80% of attendance during the total number of class days.

In case of University Departments/Centre for Studies all course teachers shall intimate the Head of the Department/Chairperson of the Centre for Studies concerned at least thirty calendar days before the last instruction day in the semester, the particulars of all students who have less than 80% of attendance during the total number of class days.

A student who has less than 80% attendance in average shall not be permitted to sit for the End-semester examination. However, that it shall be open to the University to grant exemption to a student who has attended a minimum of 70% classes but failed to obtain the prescribed 80% attendance for valid reasons, on recommendation of the Head/Chairperson/ Principals of the Department/Centre/College on payment of a prescribed fee(s).

The Head of the Departments/Chairperson of the Centre for Studies/Principals of the Colleges shall announce the names of all students who shall not be eligible to take the End- semester examinations in the various Programmes and send a copy of the same to the Controller of Examinations. Such candidates shall have to repeat the concerned Course(s) when it is offered next.

A student declared as dis-collegiate shall not be allowed to proceed to the next higher Semester. He/she shall need to pursue the Semester afresh in which he/she was declared as dis-collegiate along with the next fresh batch.

#### **Examination and Evaluation:**

- (a) Examination and evaluation shall be done on a continuous basis, at least two times during aSemester including the End Semester Examination.
- (b) There shall be 20% marks for in-semester assessment and 80% marks for End-semesterexamination in each course during every semester.

There shall be no provision for re-evaluation of the answer-scripts of the end-semester examinations. However, a candidate may apply for re-scrutiny.

#### (a) In-semester Assessment:

(i) In in-semester assessment, different tools such as objective tests, written tests, assignments, paper presentation, laboratory work, etc. suitable to the courses may be employed.

The students shall be informed in advance about the nature of assessment. Students shall be required to compulsorily attend in-semester assessment including appearing the sessional tests, failing which they will not be allowed to appear for the End-semester examination. A Student cannot repeat In-semester examinations. The Department/Centre for Studies may arrange special in-semester examination whenever necessary.

#### (c) End Semester Examination:

(i) There shall be one End semester examination carrying 80% Marks in each course of a Semester covering the entire syllabus prescribed for the

- Course. The End semester examination is normally a written/laboratory-based examination/Project Work/Dissertation.
- (ii) The Controller of Examinations shall make necessary arrangements for notifying the dates of the End semester examinations and other procedures as per Dibrugarh University Rules (at least 20 days in advance) and the Academic Calendar notified by the University.
- (iii) The time given for End-semester examination for each Course shall be based on the credits/marks of the course.
- (iv) Emphasis needs to be given on problem solving, application level questions as prescribed by National Education Policy, 2020. The question paper should include different forms of question.
- (d) *Confidential Works:* Setting of question papers, moderation of question papers, evaluation of answer scripts, scrutiny, tabulation of marks, etc. and announcement of results, shall be governed by the Dibrugarh University Examination Ordinance.
- (e) The mode of the conduct of the end-semester examinations of the practical/dissertation courses shall be partially external as below:
  - The end-semester examinations of all practical/dissertation courses shall be conducted by a Board of Examiners consisting of the internal examiner (the concerned course teacher) and an external examiner appointed by the Controller of Examinations.
  - ii. A student shall not be allowed to take more than one full course as project work in a single semester.
- (f) The mode of end-semester examination and evaluation of the Course shall be specified nthe detailed syllabus of the course concerned.
- (g) End-semester practical examinations shall normally be held before the theory examinations.

#### (h) Betterment Examination:

i. A student shall be entitled to take the 'Betterment Examinations' in any two theory courses after successful completion of 3 year/4year programme only once. In this case, the higher marks secured by the student shall be retained. The candidates shall have to apply for betterment examination within one year of passing the Sixth/Eight

Semester examination. Students shall have to appear in the betterment examination with the regular batch.

ii. No betterments shall be allowed in the practical/project/dissertation/internshipexaminations.

#### Results and Progression:

A candidate shall be declared as passed a Programme, provided he/she secures-At least 30% of marks in each Course in the End Semester Examinations combining both theory and practical examinations

At least 'P' grade in the 10 point scale combining both the in-semester and EndSemester Examination performance.

There shall be no separate pass mark for In-semester Assessment. A candidate shall be declared as passed a semester/ programme, provided he/ she secures at least 'P' grade in the 10 point scale (given in clause) in all the Courses separately.

There may be moderation of In-semester Assessment marks/End Semester marks as and when necessary.

The marks of In-semester examinations obtained by the candidate shall be carried over for declaring any result.

A candidate who fails or does not appear in one or more Courses of any end semester examinations up to fifth Semester shall be provisionally promoted to the next higher semester with the failed course as carry over course(s). Such candidates will be eligible to appear in the carryover course in the next regular examinations of those courses. If a candidate fails in any of the components (either theory or practical) of a course the candidate shall have to reappear in the examination for both the components.

If a candidate clears the sixth semester examination before clearing all the courses of the previous semesters, the result of the sixth semester examination of that candidate shall be withheld and his/ her results shall be announced only after he/ she clears the courses of the previous semesters.

A candidate who fails or does not appear in one or more courses of seventh semester examinations shall be provisionally promoted to the eighth semester with the failedcourse as carry over course(s). If a candidate clears the eight semester examination beforeclearing all the courses of the seventh semesters, the result of the eighth semester examination of that candidate shall be withheld and his/ her results shall be announced only after he/ she

clears the courses of the previous semester.

A student must clear all his/her Semester Examinations within six (6) years for three year undergraduate programme and seven years for four year undergraduate programme (with honours/research) from the dates of admission to the First Semester of any Programme irrespective of the number of examinations appeared by the student.

Since the Semester system involves continuous assessment, there shall be no scope for a student to appear as a private candidate in any programme in this system.

A candidate shall be declared to have passed provided he/she has passed all the Semesters and in all the Courses separately for the concerned programme.

The Controller of Examinations shall declare the results of different programmes and issue Grade-sheets. The merit list shall be prepared only for the regular candidates and it does not include the backlog candidates.

The first rank holder of a programme shall be decided on the basis of the CGPA. However, the Overall Weighted Percentage of Marks (OWPM) of a candidate shall be considered in case of tie in CGPA.

Results of the candidates appeared in the Betterment or Backlog Examinations shall not be counted for the award of Prizes/Medals, Rank or Distinction.

#### **Provision of Multiple Exit:**

**Exit 1:** There is a provision of exit after successful completion of 1 year (two semesters). A Certificate will be awarded when a student exits at the end of year 1 (2 semesters). Students who have secured minimum of 44 credits will be awarded a UG certificate (inthe field of study/discipline) if, in addition, they complete one work based/skill based vocational course/internship of 4 credits within one year from the completion of 2<sup>nd</sup> semester examination.

**Exit 2:** There is a provision of exit after successful completion of 2 years (four semesters. A Diploma will be awarded when a student exits at the end of year 2 (4 semesters). Students who have secured minimum of 88 credits will be awarded a UG Diploma (in the field of study/discipline) if, in addition, they complete one work

based/skill based vocational course/internship of 4 credits within one year from the completion of 4<sup>th</sup> Semester examination.

Exit 3: Three Year UG Degree Programme (BA, B. Sc, B. Com and Bachelor in other discipline) with single/double major: There is a provision of exit after successful completion of 3 years (six semesters). Students who wish

to undergo a 3-year UG programme shall be awarded UG degree in the major discipline after successful completion of three years, securing 132 credits.

Four Year UG Programme with Honours (BA, B. Sc, B. Com and Bachelor in other discipline) with single/double major: Students who wish to undergo a 4-year (8 semester) UG programme shall be awarded UG Honours degree in the major discipline after successful completion of four years with Discipline Specific Elective Courses in 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> semesters in lieu of Research Project and Dissertation, securing a minimum of 176 credits.

Four Year UG Programme with Honours with Research (BA, B. Sc, B. Com and Bachelor in other discipline) with single/double major: Students who wish to undergo a 4-year (8 semester) UG programme shall be awarded UG Honours with Research degree in the major discipline after successful completion of four years, with Research Project and Dissertation in 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> Semesters, securing 176 credits.

# **Transcript:**

The University may issue consolidated Transcript on payment of a prescribed fee which shall contain Letter grades, grade points and SGPA and CGPA mentioning the Course Titles in details, medium of instruction and programme duration.

#### **Academic Bank of Credit:**

#### **Institution Registration:**

- a) The HEIs shall register on NAD/ABC in the concerned portal. Institution shall designate a Nodal Officer and set up a dedicated NAD/ABC cell for implementation of NAD/ABC Scheme and reflect their details (Name, Designation, Mobile No. and email id) on its website.
- b) Institution shall advise the students to register on ABC through the ABC portal
- c) Institution shall make ABC id a mandatory field in the admission forms, Examination forms or if possible on students Identity card also.
- d) Institution shall display the posters and templates and place them on the canteen, Library, Notice Board and around the playground or the place where there is maximum movements of students
- e) Institution shall organize Seminar/Workshop for information and publicity aboutABC in campus as well as respective affiliated colleges.

**Student Registration:** Students shall register themselves by visiting the ABC website and creating a student account through the concerned institution and records has to be submitted to the institution.

Concerned mentor shall act as Chairperson and a nominated/selected mentee as Coordinator.

#### Functions of Mentor Mentee forum will be—

Dealing with the issues experienced by the mentees in the classroom, laboratories, internship, field work, project work etc or in any other academic activities.

Orienting the mentees the details of the FYUGP regulation.

Orienting the mentees with the academic schedule including the dates of assessment and the syllabus coverage for each assessment.

Analyzing the performance of the mentees after each of the tests and findingthe ways to improve.

Conducting at least one meeting in a month.

#### Functions of Mentor Mentee forum will be—

To act as a link between the Head of the Department/Chairperson of the Centrefor Studies and the concerned mentees.

To collect and maintain various records as required by the Department/Chairperson of the Centre for Studies.

Guiding the mentees in various academic functions To monitor the academic performances of the mentees.

To organize mentor mentee meeting.

Majuli College library started in a small room of the college in the year 1962 and moved to its present premises in 1998. With the developments in computers, communication technologies, the behavioral characteristics of the information seekers have been changing rapidly and the library is trying to its best to adapt with the technological advancement. The Library has been upgraded with the RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) technology to secure its collection in the year 2022. To move along with the technologies, library is now equipped with the Self Issue kiosk for users to issue books & returned without the library staff intervention. The library in-house functions are automated through **SOUL 2.0** Software, which assists user to locate reading material, by title, author and subject queries. Online catalogue of books is available through the **Web-OPAC**.

The Library is well equipped with modern facilities and resources (print and electronics). The library is providing various services to its users. It has been catering to the needs of fifteen hundred readers consisting of teachers, students, employees and others. It's total collection of 30,000 (thirty thousands) reading materials including text books, reference books, Competition books, North —east tribal books, Child books, bound volumes, manuscripts and specials collection of Jatindra Kr. Bargohain's and River Island on Majuli collection. The Majuli College Library is renamed as "ATUL CH. GOSWAMI LIBRARY" in the year 2012. For the last five decades, the library has been life line of the academic activities of the college.

#### **5.1 OPENING HOURS:**

The library remains open from 9.30 AM to 3.30 PM on all working days. The working hours may be curtailed or extended in special circumstances by prior library notice.

#### 5.2 MEMBERSHIP:

The membership of the library is open to all the students, teachers, and regular employees and other employees of the college.

The Librarian at his discretion may allow other individual to make temporary use of the library.

#### 5.3 CATEGORIES OF MEMBERSHIP AND THEIR PRIVILEGES:

- 5.4.3 The Librarian reserves the right to recall any book from any member at any time.
- 5.4.4 The loan period may be shortened by the Librarian if the books are of special demand.
- 5.4.5 An overdue charge of 50 paise per day per volume will be levied for late return of the books borrowed.
- 5.4.6 The Librarian reserves the right to waive overdue charge at his discretion under special circumstances.
- 5.4.7 The Librarian reserves the right to allow more books on special request, if any.

#### 5.5 LOSS OF RFID BORROWER SMART CARD AND BOOKS:

- 5.5.1 The members are responsible for the library borrower card issued to them. Damage or loss of library borrower card should be reported to the Librarian immediately. Duplicate library borrower card will be issued on payment of Rs. 50/-
- 5.5.2 Members shall be responsible for any loss which library may suffer through the loss or misuse of their borrower card.
- 5.5.3 In case of loss of books by the borrower, he/she shall either replace the book(s) or remit the cost.
  - 5.5.4 If the books of a multi-volume set is damaged or lost, the member concerned shall be liable to replace the whole set or pay the cost of the entire set on the above line.

#### **5.7 GENERAL RULES:**

- 5.7.1 Library RFID borrower smart card is not transferable.

- 5.7.4 Members shall not write upon, damage or mark any books belonging to the library.
- 5.7.5 Members shall not bring their personal belongings and library books issued to them inside the library.
- 5.7.6 Members shall be responsible for any damage caused by them to the books or any other library property and shall be required to pay the penalty imposed by the Librarian.
- 5.7.7 The members caught tearing pages/stealing of books will be suspended forthwith from using the library facilities and further disciplinary action will be initiated against them by the college.
  - 5.7.8 The members should carefully examine the books issued to them before leaving the library issue counter. They shall bring immediately to the notice of the Librarian.
  - 5.7.9 Any misuse of the *Library Reader's Smart Card* may lead to cancellation of privilege enjoyed by the members.

#### 5.8 OTHER RULES:

- 5.8.1 When the students have any complaint about the library service, they should not enter into any argument with the library staff, but bring it to the notice of the Librarian in writing.
  - 5.8.2 The users of the library may suggest the Librarian to purchase any book or journal or any other reading materials.

# 6. <u>LABORATORIES</u>

There are six laboratories in all. Out of these six, there are four laboratories in Science, one in Arts and one common laboratory for both Arts and Science. They are Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Education and Geography respectively. These laboratories are running in newly constructed buildings in neat and clean atmosphere.

# 7. <u>N.S.S.</u>



The college has a unit of National Service Scheme for generating awareness towards social service among the students. One of the faculty members is placed in charge of the unit. Under this scheme a team of students desirous of rendering social service organizes camps in backward areas mostly within and occasionally outside Majuli every year. Such students are issued certificates on successful completion of their camp. The college successfully organized a national level NSS Mega Camp in 2015. This was the first of its kind organized by any college in Assam.

# 8. N.C.C.

The college has a wing of the 9<sup>th</sup> Assam Battalion of Senior Divisional National Cadet Corps with the strength of 100 cadets (boys & girls) under an N.C.C. officer chosen from the teaching staff of the college. These cadets are given special training in the interest of national defense. The aspiring students are selected for N.C.C. training after a thorough check-up of their physical and mental fitness. They are issued certificates on successful completion of their training camps,



which are held within and outside the state. Besides, they regularly take part in the Independence Day and Republic Day parade organized by the District Administration of Majuli on the scheduled days.

## 9. PUBLICATION DIVISION:

With the objective of documenting and publishing some research-related and creative works by the faculty and also works on Majuli having lasting academic value, the college set up a Publication Division in 2021. The Publication Division has brought out so far two volumes of miscellaneous write-ups by the faculty of the college. The inaugural volume entitled *Kimodhikmiti* was published in 2020 under the editorship of Dr. Debajit Saikia, Principal of the college, and the other volume entitled *Anwiskhon* under the editorship of Apurbajyoti Hazarika, Assistant Professor of English, was published in the year 2022. The Division plans to undertake more projects of publication in the days to come.

#### 10. STUDENTS' UNION

Majuli College Students' Union is the general body of the students. Every authorized student of the college automatically becomes its member. Annual Students' Union Election gives an opportunity to each and every student to elect office-bearers of the Union through direct ballot. It promotes democratic awareness among the students. M.C.S.U. also undertakes various co-curricular activities like games and sports, debating, and various other musical and cultural activities. These are conducive to all-round development of students' personality. Both in cultural and sports events our students have exhibited outstanding performance not only at inter-college competitions but also at university level.

# 11.(A) GIRLS' HOSTEL



The college currently possesses 02 (two) nos. of two-storey Girls' Hostel which can accommodate 80 girls. Girls desirous of hostel accommodation may opt for the same in their application forms for admission. The hostel is placed under the supervision of a woman teacher as its warden. The borders are required to abide by a set of rules and regulations laid down by the college authority, and conform to a strict code of conduct both in and outside the college campus.

### 11.(B) BOYS' HOSTEL



The college has a two-storey Boys' Hostel situated at Jibeswar Boruah Kshetra, Majuli College which can accommodate 20 boys under the supervision of a teacher as its warden. The borders are required to abide by a set of rules and regulations laid down by the college authority, and conform to a strict code of conduct both in and outside the college campus.

# 12. PLAYGROUND AND GAMES



Majuli College has a spacious playground measuring

an area of three acres of land on the bank of *Doria Dubi*. Outdoor games are held on the playground during Annual College Sports Week. Some of the outdoor games are also held on the campus ground. The college has a well-equipped volleyball court with the latest ground-light. Moreover, various indoor game facilities such as TT, badminton, chess are also available in the college.

# 13. COMMON ROOMS

Apart from Teachers' Common Room, there are two Students' Common Rooms: one for the boys and the other for the girls. The Common Rooms are well-furnished and well-equipped with facilities for playing table tennis, carom, chess, ludo and badminton.

# 14. FLOWER GARDEN

There is a beautiful and well-maintained garden in the college premises. Flowers such as salvia, petunia, pansy, gladiolus, marigold, dahlia, daisy, sunflower, lily, jasmine besides many other domestic breeds, are adorning the garden lending it a seasonal beauty all the year round.



# 15. CYCLE STAND



There are three separate cycle stands on the college campus: two for the students and the other for the teachers and employees. A strict vigil is maintained on these stands so that no incident of theft occurs.

# 16. CANTEEN



A spacious and hygienic canteen named *Byanjana* with indoor seating arrangement separately for teachers and students is available on the college campus. It provides a variety of eatables to the students, teachers and others. On special occasions, it facilitates arrangement of parties as well. Health hazards are taken care of.

# 17. HEALTH FACILITY



The college is located in the neighbourhood of a Community Health Centre. In the event of any emergency, government doctors are consulted immediately. Yet, we have a First-Aid Box at the disposal of a competent teacher, who attends upon sick students suffering from temporary and non-

serious ailments. The college provides services on health issues like nutrition, abuses of drugs, remedies of depression, stress and eating disorders etc. The college also provides Ambulance facility to its students and the faculty.

#### 18. KESHABRAM BORAH AUDITORIUM

The college has a well-equipped auditorium known as **Keshabram Borah Auditorim** having capacity to accommodate an audience of almost 700. Various cultural functions, seminars, congregations, workshops etc. are organized regularly in the auditorium.



#### 19. DIGITAL CLASS ROOM/CONFERENCE ROOM

The college has two digital class rooms where students are taught with smart boards, projectors and other ICT gadgets. Besides, there is a well-furnished conference room in the heritage building of the college which remains instrumental in organizing meetings, seminars and conferences etc.



#### **20. MEMORIAL LECTURES:**

The college organizes at present two memorial lectures—one commemorating the memory of late Muhidhar Bharali, former Selection Grade Lecturer in Economics of the college, organized by the Department of Economics, and the other in the memory of late Debendra Nath Goswami, noted educationist and social worker of Majuli, organized by the IQAC of the college. Distinguished academicians and intellectuals are invited to deliver these lectures.

#### 21. LITERARY FORUM:

The college has a literary body named *Majuli College Literary Forum* which periodically organizes literary meets, seminars and workshops that keep the intellectual ambience of the college vibrant. It also brings out an annual refereed journal named *Bodhidroom* (ISSN: 2321-4791).

#### **22. C.C. CAMERA**


The daily proceedings of the college are under sophisticated CCTV camera surveillance. In order to ensure a healthy work culture among all the stakeholders, the college authority constantly monitors their behavior and activities through this service and takes prompt action in case of any discrepancy found.

#### 23. THE COLLEGE MAGAZINE:

Majuli College has a long tradition of publishing its annual magazine under the able guidance of the teachers through Students' Union. Previously it was known as *Majuli Mahavidyalaya Alochani* (Majuli College Magazine). Later from 1993 onward it came to be known as *Majulian*. It has contributed a lot to cultivating creative skill and preserving individual talent of both students and the teachers.

In addition to the magazine, there is a provision of a wall magazine in the college known as *Samiran* which is brought out by the Students' Union annually.

Besides, several teaching departments of the college bring out their departmental magazines/ bulletins/ wall-magazines and so on.



#### 24. RESEARCH JOURNAL

The college has a peer reviewed journal named *Bodhidroom*(ISSN: 2321-4791) with annual periodicity published by its literary body known as *Majuli College Literary Forum* where eminent scholars, academicians and researchers of the nation and state contribute their write-ups.

#### 25. <u>IDENTITY CARD</u>

A Photo Identity Card signed by the Principal is issued to each and every student of the college. A provisional Identity Card form has been attached with this prospectus and the students must submit the filled-in Identity card form along with the application form. The final and renewed Identity Cards will be provided to the students in due course.

Intending and eligible students are required to apply for those scholarships. National and State Merit Scholarships are available purely on merit basis. The scholarships such as Jindal and LIC, however, will depend on consistent good result of the students. For S.C., S.T., O.B.C. and M.O.B.C. scholarship the production of caste certificate in original, when required, is a must.

#### 27. STUDENTS' AID FUND

The college has a Students' Aid Fund raised by way of collecting Rs. 20/- from every student admitted to the college. The poor and needy students are financially helped by the college from this fund. The amount of money and the number of beneficiaries depend on the position of the fund. It varies from year to year depending on the enrolment of students. A committee constituted for this purpose looks into it and determines eligibility by consulting local people, fellow students and familiar teachers.

#### 28. UNIFORM



The college has introduced a uniform dress for all the students of the college. The boys are required to wear white shirt and navy-blue pant while the girls are required to wear white *chadar* with blue border, white *mekhela* and white blouse. The college uniform is a must for all students and the Students' Union always keeps a vigil in this regard. The uniform has proved instrumental in fostering unity equality and brotherhood among all classes of students over the years.

#### 29. ATTENDANCE

For appearing in the examinations conducted by Assam Higher Secondary Education Council or Dibrugarh University at least 80% attendance is compulsory. Those registering poor percentage of attendance are fined/barred from appearing at final examination as per university or AHSEC norms.

### 30. PLASTIC AND TOBACCO-FREE ZONE





The college has been declared a plastic and tobacco-free zone. Consumption of intoxicants of any kind, tobacco-induced spitting anywhere in and around the campus is strictly prohibited. Any such act, if found with sufficient evidence, shall be treated stringently. Besides, use of plastic materials and their haphazard disposal is barred inside the college campus.

The college has won accolades from the District Administration of Majuli as a totally tobaccofree institution.

#### 31. TESTS AND EXAMINATION

All the students are required to appear at a series of tests and examinations conducted from time to time. They are subjected to Unit Tests every month on the dates and days suited to the teachers of respective subjects. In addition, they have to appear at Terminal Examinations, Sessional Examinations, Seminars, Group Discussions etc as per the schedule to be notified by the Principal in due time. Appearing at these examinations is obligatory. Non-compliance is liable to penalty.

#### 32. REMEDIAL COURSES

Remedial courses in English, Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry are available in the college. The students, poor in these subjects, can receive guidance from able teachers as per the schedule to be notified by the Principal.

#### **33. STUDENT MENTORING:**

The college has introduced the practice of student mentoring from the last academic session. A group of students across all programmes and courses are assigned to a teacher who will mentor and guide them towards solving any problem, academic, institutional, personal or psychological, which they grapple with during their period of study at the college.

#### 34. STUDENT FEEDBACK:

The college has been pursuing a practice of collecting structured feedback from students and their parents/guardians for the last three years with a view to bringing about holistic improvement in the academic environment of the college. Feedback is collected from students at periodic intervals, analysed and action is taken thereupon. However, students registering a poor percentage of attendance are not considered eligible for rendering their feedback.

#### 35. NEW SCHOOLS/ STUDY CENTRES/ P.G. PROGRAMMES

Majuli College stands on the verge of being upgraded to a full-fledged PG College. Necessary financial grants for constructing administrative building, classrooms etc for the purpose have been released and their construction is in progress. As such, the PG programme under regular mode is expected to start soon. The college has started the study centre/ contact centre of **KKHSOU** and **Dibrugarh University Distance Education** in the college premises. Various degree courses such as B.A., B.Sc., M.A. and so on, recognized by the University, are offered in the study centres. In D.U Distance Education Study Centre, B.A. and M.A. programmes in Mathematics, English, Assamese, Economics, Political Science, Sociology and Education are offered. The time of admission and other relevant information regarding the courses will be notified in due course in the newspapers, through the college website and on the notice board. **Interested candidate may contact Dr. Brojen Ch. #### 36. DIFFERENT CELLS/COMMITTEES

**36.1 CAREER GUIDANCE CELL**: The college runs a career Guidance Cell placed in the charge of competent teachers, which periodically organizes lectures and counseling sessions by experts related to various career options of the present competitive employability market. Students' queries are prioritized.

**36.2 PLACEMENT CELL**: The Placement Cell of the college works hand in hand with the Career Guidance Cell. The cell keeps track of the students' placements besides offering them the latest information regarding various placement opportunities. The students finding jobs midway through their study are required to submit their placement details to the cell before leaving the institution. It is obligatory for the other students also, if placed/employed handsomely on completion of their study, to submit detailed information over telephone or in person to the cell for the sake of maintaining a record of its alumni.

**36.3 VIGILANCE AND GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL CELL**: In order to ensure a decent academic environment in the college, the college has a Vigilance and Grievance Redressal Cell in place. This cell, placed in charge of teachers and also having sufficient student representation, keeps a vigil on the overall academic environment of the college and strives to redress all grievances of students related to teaching-learning and other issues. The student with any grievance/complaint has to address Principal in writing stating clearly the nature of his/her grievance and requesting redressal of the same at an early date. The application must be dropped at the Grievance Box hung in front of the Administrative Coordinator's chamber. The cell opens the box on daily basis and tries its best to redress the grievances involving all stakeholders as early as possible.

**36.4 RESEARCH ADVISORY COMMITTEE**: The college has a Research Advisory Committee consisting of members from both Teaching and Non-Teaching staff which looks after the research related issues of the teachers and students. The committee strives for creation of a healthy research ambience in the college by constantly boosting the research aptitude of the teachers and students.

#### 37. ADMISSION PROCEDURE

There is an Admission Committee, which interviews the candidates seeking admission and lays terms and conditions for the same. 40 (Forty) percent at Higher Secondary Examination is the cut off marks for admission into degree major courses, but, for other courses there is no such bar. A candidate having passed his/ her previous examination can apply for Higher Secondary/ Degree Course. There is no age limit as such. Admission will be in online mode. Details of admission may be seen in the college website **www.majulicollege.in**. However, original documents shall have to produce for verification when notified. Admission will be on merit basis and as per Govt. Reservation Rules. Those who are not able to submit application forms online due to lack of internet facility or some other reasons may avail assistance from the Help Desk in the B.Voc.(IT) Department of the college during working hours. Students from Boards or Universities other than SEBA, AHSEC or Dibrugarh University shall have to produce Migration Certificate at the time of admission. All admissions are provisional and subject to the approval of D.U. / AHSEC.

The admission procedure for all Under Graduate Courses normally starts in the month of June every year. The admission schedule is displayed through College Notice-Board & Website. Duly filled in application forms along with photocopies of admit cards, all marks sheets and pass certificate and caste certificate must be submitted within the stipulated time(s).

The lists of selected candidates are displayed on the College Notice-Board. Selected candidates have to appear personally before an interview board and to produce all testimonials in original at the time of interview.

Change of stream or subject after the admission is not allowed.

As per Dibrugarh University regulations the candidates having a gap of more than 3(three) years after passing the Higher Secondary course shall not be permitted to take admission in the B.A/B.Sc. courses provided that a candidate pursuing some other courses of study shall be relaxed from the above mentioned conditions.

## 38. INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE CELL (IQAC)

The college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) which was established in 2003. This cell with Principal as its Chairman and one of the senior teachers as its coordinator consists of around twenty members representing the teaching and student communities of the college and the local society. The IQAC of the college functions around the following benchmarks:

#### **Functions**

#### Some of the functions of the IQAC are:

- 1. Development and application of quality benchmarks/parameters for various academic and administrative activities of the institution;
- 2. Facilitating the creation of a learner-centric environment conducive to quality education and faculty maturation to adopt the required knowledge and technology for participatory teaching and learning process;
- 3. Arrangement for feedback response from students, parents and other stakeholders on quality-related institutional processes;
- 4. Dissemination of information on various quality parameters of higher education;
- 5. Organization of inter and intra institutional workshops, seminars on quality related themes and promotion of quality circles;

- 6. Documentation of the various programmes/activities leading to quality improvement;
- 7. Acting as a nodal agency of the Institution for coordinating quality-related activities, including adoption and dissemination of best practices;
- 8. Development and maintenance of institutional database through MIS for the purpose of maintaining /enhancing the institutional quality;
- 9. Development of Quality Culture in the institution;
- 10. Preparation of the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) as per guidelines and parameters of NAAC, to be submitted to NAAC.

#### 39. ENTRANCE TESTS FOR MAJOR

Entrance tests for admission into Major courses are conducted by the certain departments before admission. Selection will be made on the basis of the marks obtained in HS + marks obtained in the entrance test. Dates of the test will be notified in due course of time. The final decision to hold the test or do otherwise shall remain vested with concerned departments.

In the other subjects, admission to the Major Courses will be on the basis of marks obtained in the concerned subject in the Higher Secondary Final Examination.

#### 40. RESERVATION

The college strictly follows the govt. policies of reservation pertaining to admission of students belonging to SC, ST (Plains) and ST (Hills), OBC, MOBC, Differently-abled categories as well EWS. 5% of the total seats are also reserved for the students having proficiency in sports, NCC, NSS, Scout-Guide and co-curricular activities. Applications from students having single parent alive and land donors will also be considered. Candidates applying for caste reservation must produce Caste Certificate countersigned by the SDO (Civil) or DC. Candidates applying for other categories of reservation must produce appropriate certificate. For sport category certificates of outstanding performance at inter-district or higher level only will be considered.

#### 45. CODE OF ETHICS FOR STUDENTS ON COLLEGE CAMPUS

- Students must behave decently with all stakeholders of the college. Any foul behavior, if reported, shall be treated seriously.
- Wearing of the college uniform by all during college hours is mandatory.
- The college Identity Card must be kept in such a way that it remains viewable to everybody.
- Consumption of all types of intoxicants such as tobacco, *paan*, *gutkha* etc. is strictly prohibited inside the college campus. Any indulgence in *paan*-induced spitting on walls or anywhere on college campus, if found with sufficient evidence, shall be treated stringently and may result in either expulsion or pecuniary punishment, as the case may be.
- Compliance with rules and regulations laid down by the Students' Union is mandatory.
- Maintaining decency in respect of hair styles, beard and other costumes is obligatory.
- Abstinence from indulging in such acts as might provoke religious or communal disharmony is mandatory.
- Abstinence from acts damaging the academic ambience of the college or the decency of students is mandatory.
- Parking of bicycles, motor cycles and cars in any place other than the fixed stands is prohibited. Riding/driving at a slow speed and abstaining from playing horn at the time of entry and exit is obligatory.

#### Non-compliance with the above shall invite strict disciplinary action.























